Introduction

The minority public health student career guide is a vital resource designed to assist individuals from marginalized communities navigate their career paths effectively. It provides information, advice, and strategies to help minority students make informed decisions about their career interests within Public Health and further their awareness of the field. Ultimately, this empowers Black, Latino, and Native American students to take control of their career development and achieve their professional goals.

Importance

The public health workforce must be more representative of the population it serves. Practitioners with marginalized identities are better equipped to serve clients from marginalized communities, lowering medical mistrust.¹ A diverse public health workforce is necessary to address the far-reaching health effects of inequality. The overall number and proportion of graduates from underrepresented minority groups in public health schools have increased; however, the percentage of Black, Latino, and Native American students graduates remains low.²

Specific needs and challenges faced by minority public health students in their career journeys:

- Lack of knowledge and awareness about careers in public health at high school and college graduations.
- Challenges include the "leaky pipeline," lack of resources and guidance, and negative connotations of specific terminologies for Native American students.
- Colleges nationwide are implementing more significant career service programs to aid students in their career goals and interests.

Public Health Specializations:

Public Health Specializations delve into different areas such as Biostatistics, Community Health, Environmental Health, Epidemiology, Global Health, and Health Equity, highlighting their scopes, impacts, and career opportunities.

<u>Biostatistics</u>² ▶

Specialty Scope: The collection, analysis, interpretation, and presentation of data that affects health and health outcomes.

Impact: Design, implement, and analyze health-related studies. **Career Opportunities:** pharmaceutical companies, hospitals, independent research groups, public health organizations, and government agencies.

Community Health³

Specialty Scope: Public health addresses the needs of all citizens within a community, not one individual group, and offers a broad outlook on awareness, education, and research.

Impact: Perform community assessments and develop and implement health programs. Know how adequate community health education can lead to better preventative habits.

Career Opportunities: Include community centers, health and wellness clinics, state and local government agencies, and health departments.

Environmental Health⁴

Specialty Scope: Human health and the environment's health as it affects the population's well-being.

Impact: Understand toxicology, disease prevention, zoonotic diseases, occupational hazards, and air and water quality. Know how societies, occupations, and geography affect population health.

Career Opportunities: Academia, companies involved in chemicals or pharmaceuticals, and environmental protection agencies at the local, state, and federal levels.

Epidemiology⁵ ►

Specialty Scope: Study of population disease, illness, and associated risk. **Impact:** Ability to use epidemiological and statistical methods within data analysis, research design, and transferring information into written communication.

Career Opportunities: include local, state, and federal government agencies, Research laboratories academia, and pharmaceutical research.

Specialty Scope: Addressing the inequalities and disparities in healthcare access, treatment, and outcomes across race, ethnicity, geographic residence, gender, sexual orientation, and disability status.
Impact: Understanding health disparities and social determinants, as well as the ability to identify opportunities and design, implement, evaluate, and monitor interventions and policies to advance health equity.
Career Opportunities: County and state health departments, non-profit organizations.

Building Essential Skills

Building Essential Skills focuses on developing critical competencies needed for success in public health careers, ensuring that students are well-prepared for their professional journey.

Skills for Success:

Skills for Success covers vital skills such as Communication, Teamwork, Analytical/Assessment, Program Planning, Cultural Competency, Leadership, and Problem-Solving. Through practical examples and resources, discover how to enhance these abilities.



Communication

Effective organizational communication enables individuals or groups to convey information effectively and efficiently. This skill encompasses verbal and non-verbal forms of expression, including written, spoken, and visual communication.



Teamwork

Teamwork entails collaborating and working together towards a common goal or objective. This skill involves sharing responsibilities, leveraging each other's strengths, and supporting one another to achieve collective success.

Analytical/Assessment

The ability to gather, interpret, and evaluate information to solve problems, make decisions, and formulate strategies. Individuals with strong analytical skills can break down complex problems into smaller components, identify patterns and trends, and draw logical conclusions based on available data.

Program Planning

Design, organize, and coordinate initiatives or projects to achieve specific objectives or outcomes. This skill involves creating structured plans that outline the goals, activities, timelines, resources, and evaluation methods required for successful implementation.



Cultural Competency

The ability of individuals and organizations to effectively interact, communicate, and collaborate with people from diverse cultural backgrounds. This skill involves recognizing and valuing diversity by understanding and respecting different cultural groups' values, beliefs, norms, and practices.

Leadership

The ability to guide, inspire, and motivate individuals or teams to achieve common goals and objectives. This skill involves setting a clear vision, providing direction, and fostering a supportive environment where people can thrive and contribute their best efforts.

Problem-Solving

The ability to identify, analyze, and resolve challenges or obstacles in work settings. This skill involves critical thinking, creativity, and resourcefulness in developing practical solutions to complex problems.

Through this process, you will gain confidence in assessing problems accurately, selecting the appropriate decision-making approaches for the situation at hand, making team decisions, and measuring the success of the solution's implementation.

Problem-Solving Resource

Problems can occur anytime, and solutions often need to be found quickly. Various tools will help you identify a problem's source, brainstorm solutions, and select the best option.

Navigating Educational Pathways

Choosing the Right Program:

Choosing the Right Program provides tips on evaluating undergraduate and graduate programs based on accreditation, diversity and inclusion, curriculum relevance, faculty diversity, research opportunities, and support services.

Accreditation

Look for programs accredited by the Council on Education for Public Health (CEPH). Accredited programs ensure quality education and may enhance job prospects.

Diversity and Inclusion

Research the institution's commitment to diversity and inclusion. Consider programs that actively support minority students through mentorship, networking opportunities, and cultural sensitivity training.

Curriculum

Evaluate the curriculum to ensure it covers many public health topics relevant to minority health disparities. Look for courses or concentrations focusing on health equity, social determinants of health, and cultural competency.

Faculty Diversity

Consider the diversity of the faculty within the program. Having a diverse faculty can provide different perspectives and support for minority students.

Research Opportunities

Explore research opportunities within the program, particularly those focused on minority health issues. Research experience can strengthen your skills and enhance your resume or CV.

Networking and Support

Look for programs that offer networking opportunities and support services tailored to minority students. This may include student organizations, affinity groups, and career development workshops.

Internships and Fellowships:

Internships and Fellowships highlight opportunities such as the NHHF Internship Program, California Leadership Fellowship, and CDC's Undergraduate Public Health Scholars (CUPS) Program, which provide hands-on experience and professional growth.

NHHF

Internship Program

The Program Intern plays a vital role within the NHHF team; this individual will have the ability to learn about program management, project execution, fundraising, event planning, and much more. The Program Intern should be entrepreneurial, highly motivated, and energetic. S/he should be attentive to details and be able to handle multiple projects and deadlines. The applicant should be familiar with or interested in working with the Hispanic community and medical professionals.

California Leadership Fellowship Program

 An executive training program that aims to advance the careers of Hispanic physicians pursuing work with the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services, State and City Health Commissioner positions, academic leaders in medical schools, and chief medical officers in federal clinics and private practice.

NHMA

Leadership Fellowship Program

The program offers students a unique opportunity to apply academic and problemsolving skills to real-life work experiences.

CDC Undergraduate Public Health Scholars (CUPS) Program CDC's Undergraduate Public

 The CDC John R. Lewis Undergraduate Public Health Scholars [Lewis Scholars; formerly CDC Undergraduate Public Health Scholars (CUPS)] program prepares a diverse body of students to consider public health as a career to ensure a future where the American public benefits from a more diverse and better-trained public health workforce. During the internship, a core area of study and practice is related to the health needs of U.S. minorities and other populations often underserved and underrepresented in the field.

Overcoming Challenges

Overcoming Challenges addresses the unique obstacles that minority public health students may face, providing strategies for resilience, selfcare, and overcoming barriers to success.

Addressing Minority-Specific Challenges:

Addressing Minority-Specific Challenges highlights critical issues such as representation, discrimination, and imposter syndrome, offering insights into how these challenges affect students and ways to confront them effectively.

Representation

Representation is critical for minority college students. When individuals from underrepresented backgrounds see people who look like them in leadership positions, faculty roles, or successful careers, it can profoundly impact their own aspirations. Positive representation provides role models, fosters a sense of possibility, and combats stereotypes.

Discrimination

Discrimination against minority college students remains a pressing issue, affecting educational experiences and overall well-being and manifesting in various forms. Examples are, admission disparities, microaggressions, and unequal treatment in academic and social settings. There is also a psychological toll of continuously dealing with discrimination, which may lead to greater levels of stress, anxiety, and a sense of isolation.

Imposter Syndrome

Imposter syndrome weighs heavily on the shoulders of minority students navigating academic environments. Despite their accomplishments, students may attribute their success to luck or external factors rather than their abilities, fearing that they don't truly belong.

How Students of Color Confront Imposter Syndrome - Dena Simmons

Resilience and Self-Care:

Resilience and Self-Care emphasizes the importance of setting sustainable goals, prioritizing self-care, creating healthy boundaries, and building a supportive network. Discover practical tips for managing stress, maintaining emotional well-being, and achieving a balanced, fulfilling academic and professional life.

- *Set Sustainable Goals:* Begin by setting realistic and achievable goals. Recognize your limitations and your other needs beyond work.
- 2 *Prioritize Self-Care:* Self-care should be considered an integral part of your journey, not an extra step. Make time for meaningful conversations, take walks in nature, and ensure you get enough quality sleep.
- **3 Create Healthy Boundaries:** Establish clear distinctions between work and non-work time. Set boundaries for when you'll engage with work-related tasks and when you'll focus on your personal life.
- Practice Time Management and Prioritization: Efficiently manage your time by prioritizing tasks. Break your work into manageable chunks, and take regular breaks that allow you to maintain focus and productivity without feeling overwhelmed.
- **5 Build Your Support Network:** Connect with friends, family, or colleagues who understand your ambitions and encourage your well-being. Having a network to lean on during challenging times is crucial.
- *Pay Attention to Your Emotions:* Acknowledge your feelings and emotions. If stress or burnout creeps in, seek professional help.

- Research Participating Companies: research the companies present before attending a career fair. Prepare questions and tailor your approach based on their industry and offerings.
- Practice Your Elevator Pitch: Be ready to introduce yourself succinctly and highlight your skills and experiences. Prepare questions and tailor your approach based on their industry and offerings.
- Bring Copies of Your Resume: Have multiple copies of your resume to distribute to recruiters. Make sure it's updated and tailored to the types of roles you're seeking.
- Follow-up: After the career fair, follow up with recruiters or representatives from companies you're interested in. Send a thank-you email and express your continued interest in their organization.
